casualty statistics

Sadly, a recent FBI report shows that incidences of school and workplace violence are increasing annually. Even in the best of circumstances, emergency medical service (EMS) providers may not be in a position to immediately render aid to the wounded. Because of this, it is up to the individuals at the scene to help the victims and stop the bleeding.

Studies show that hemorrhage (bleeding) represents the largest percentage of preventable deaths in penetrating trauma, such

as shootings. In an effort to save innocent lives, the Casualty Care course applies the lessons learned from the global war on terror to your setting by teaching the basics of hemorrhage control.

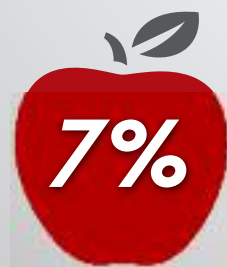
Research also shows that a feeling of helplessness is one of the leading causes of post-traumatic stress disorder. By empowering the staff to act, we hope to bring them peace of mind.

Kit contents

- Instructional card
- Gloves
- ACE pressure dressing
- Multi-purpose gauze
- SWAT-Tourniquet (SWAT-T)

Instruction

Training is designed to take less than one hour of total time. **Trainees receive a short survey and link to an instructional video prior to attending the on-site training.** On the day of training, a short presentation is given followed by hands-on exercises using the Casualty Care Kit equipment and training aids. Trainees have the opportunity to ask questions and are given a follow-up survey to assess the trainers and identify other needs.

Ongoing training

This course is designed in a train-the-trainer format. This ensures you will have local instructors available to handle staff turnover or re-education needs.

Implementation

Trainers are experts in their field. Both law enforcement and EMS personnel provide comprehensive education.

Partnering

EMS providers, law enforcement, hospitals, fire departments, schools and businesses are all essential in a well planned, multi-disciplinary approach. This is not only an effective way to get community support, but also a way to ensure sustainability.

Funding options

- **Grants**—There are many grants available from the public safety sector. Most cities have a person well versed in available grants.

What are the liability concerns?

Good Samaritan laws are very applicable to this plan. Check with your local legal department.

What's the risk of blood exposure?

The risk is realistically very minimal. Course training addresses this topic, and gloves are included in the kit to minimize risk.
